This Agrément Certificate Product Sheet⁽¹⁾ relates to RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems, for use as a mechanically-fastened or fully-adhered waterproofing layer on flat and pitched roofs.

Weathertightness — the systems will resist the passage of moisture to the interior of the building (see section 6).

Properties in relation to fire — the systems will enable a roof to be unrestricted under the Building Regulations (see section 7).

Resistance to wind uplift — the systems will resist the effects of any likely wind suction acting on the roof (see section 8).

Resistance to foot traffic — the systems will accept the limited foot traffic and loads associated with installation and maintenance (see section 9).

Durability — under normal service conditions, the systems will provide a durable waterproof covering with a service life of at least 35 years (see section 11).

The BBA has awarded this Certificate to the company named above for the systems described herein. These systems have been assessed by the BBA as being fit for their intended use provided they are installed, used and maintained as set out in this Certificate.

Technical Specification

1 Description

1.1 RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems include membranes manufactured to the characteristics given in Table 1, available in two forms: a standard dusted form or a clean membrane to aid joint splicing.

1.2 For an alternative method of splicing, the membranes are available with a factory-applied tape .

1.3 RubberBond-White is an alternative version of the RubberBond FR EPDM membranes in which the top laminate is white. It is manufactured to the same specifications and has the same nominal properties as the black version.

1.4 Other products for use in the systems are:

- Bonding Adhesive 90.8.30A — a solvent-based contact cement, based on polychloroprene (Neoprene) for bonding the EPDM sheet to the substrate
- Splicing Cement EP95 — a cement based on solvent, butyl rubber and other synthetic resins which is cold-applied to bond laps between EPDM sheets and/or EPDM flashing
- SecurTAPE — a synthetic rubber-based tape for use in lap jointing
- Factory-applied Tape — 75 mm or 150 mm wide SecurTAPE used to prefabricate membranes at the factory into larger sheets prior to delivery to site
- HP-250 Primer — a primer for use with Splicing Cement, SecurTAPE or pressure-sensitive products in preparation of membrane surface
- LV-600 Primer — an alternative primer for use with Splicing Cement, SecurTAPE or pressure-sensitive products in preparation of membrane surface
- splice cleaner — a synthetic rubber/resin solution for cleaning EPDM prior to bonding laps, except when splice tape is used.

1.5 Ancillary items for use with these systems, but outside the scope of the Certificate, are:

- RubberBond EPDM Elastoform and RubberBond-White Flashing — non-vulcanised (uncured) EPDM 1.5 mm thick with a polythene backing, available in widths from 150 mm to 450 mm
- pressure-sensitive products — a range of detailing products (such as flashings, corners) with a pressure adhesive incorporated
- In-seam Sealant — a rubber-based sealant applied within lap joints made using Splicing Cement EP95 only
- Lap Sealant — an EPDM mastic to form a feathered edge along lap edges at flashings and details and at field splices when Splicing Cement EP95 is used
- Water Cut-off Mastic — a synthetic rubber/resin sealing mastic to act as a sealing agent between the EPDM or flashing sheets and accessories
- Walkway sheeting — a special 8 mm thick styrene butadiene rubber (SBR) sheet, to give additional protection in areas of high accessibility
- Colour coating — an acrylic, elastic roof coating to provide optional roof colours
- RubberBond-White accessories — RubberBond-White splicing cement, RubberBond-White Splice Cleaner and RubberBond-White Lap Sealant are used with RubberBond-White and serve the same purpose as their counterparts
- pourable sealer — a two-component, solvent-free, polyurethane-based sealant, for use in areas where flashing is difficult to apply

- RUSS strip — a reinforced EPDM membrane strip which is fastened to the substrate. The membrane is adhered to this at the roof perimeter and penetrations
- fasteners and fastening plates — for use in mechanically-fastened applications
- termination bars — for fixing membrane at roof perimeters.

2 Manufacture

2.1 RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems are manufactured by blending EPDM (ethylene-propylene-diene monomer), processing oils and other additives. The sheets are produced by calendaring or extruding, then vulcanising.

2.2 As part of the assessment and ongoing surveillance of product quality, the BBA has:

- agreed with the manufacturer the quality control procedures and product testing to be undertaken
- assessed and agreed the quality control operated over batches of incoming materials
- monitored the production process and verified that it is in accordance with the documented process
- evaluated the process for management of nonconformities
- checked that equipment has been properly tested and calibrated
- undertaken to carry out the above measures on a regular basis through a surveillance process, to verify that the specifications and quality control operated by the manufacturer are being maintained.

3 Delivery and site handling

3.1 The membranes are delivered to site in rolls wrapped in polythene. Provision may be required for load spreading and handling at roof level when large area sheets are used. The wrapper bears the product name, identification and the BBA logo incorporating the number of this Certificate.

3.2 Rolls should be stored on the delivery pallet, horizontally in a cool, dry area and under cover. The membranes should only be unwrapped from the packaging at the time of installation, and unused material returned to its packaging until required.

3.3 The accessories are normally delivered in quantities of:

Splicing Cement EP95 and HP-250 Primer	3.8 litre or 9.5 litre cans
Splice Cleaner, bonding adhesive and colour coating	3.8 litre or 18.9 litre cans
Lap Sealant and Water Cut-off Mastic	25-tube cartons
In-seam Sealant	10-tube cartons
LV-600 Primer	3.8 litre cans

3.4 Ancillary items classified under *The Chemicals (Hazard Information and Packaging for Supply) Regulations 2009* (CHIP4)/*Classification, Labelling and Packaging of Substances and Mixtures (CLP Regulation) 2009* are given in Table 2 along with flashpoints. These products bear the appropriate hazard warning.

3.5 EPDM flashing rolls should be stored in a clean, dry position and in temperatures between 5°C and 25°C. The flashing cures gradually and should not be stored for more than nine months. As the flashing cures it will become less flexible and more difficult to form at details, although this does not affect its waterproofing characteristics.

3.6 Bonding adhesive, Splicing Cement EP95, Lap Sealant, In-seam Sealant, Water Cut-off Mastic and Colour coating should be stored in a dry place in temperatures between 5°C and 25°C. Site storage of these products should not exceed six months.

Assessment and Technical Investigations

The following is a summary of the assessment and technical investigations carried out on RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems.

4 General

4.1 RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems are satisfactory for use as a mechanically-fastened or fully-adhered waterproofing layer on flat and pitched roofs with limited access.

4.2 Limited access roofs are defined for the purpose of this Certificate as those subjected only to pedestrian traffic for maintenance of the roof covering, cleaning of gutters, etc. Where traffic in excess of this is envisaged additional protection to the membrane must be provided.

4.3 Flat roofs are defined for the purpose of this Certificate as those having a minimum finished fall of 1:80. For design purposes, twice the minimum finished fall should be assumed, unless a detailed analysis of the roof is available, including overall and local deflection, direction of falls, etc. Pitched roofs are defined for the purpose of this Certificate as those having a fall in excess of 1:6.

4.4 Decks to which the membrane is to be applied must comply with the relevant requirements of BS 6229 : 2003, BS 8217 : 2005 and, where appropriate, *NHBC Standards 2014*, Chapter 7.1.

4.5 Contact with bituminous, coal tar and oil-based products must be avoided as the membrane is incompatible with lower grades of bitumen. If contact with such products is likely, a separating layer must be interposed before installing the waterproof sheet. Where doubt arises, the advice of the Certificate holder should be sought.

4.6 Insulation systems or materials used in conjunction with the product must be approved by the Certificate holder and either:

- as described in BS 8217 : 2005, or
- the subject of a current BBA Certificate and be used in accordance with, and within the limitations of, that Certificate.

4.7 If rigid glassfibre or mineral wool roof insulation products are used they must be overlaid with 13 mm thick fibreboard unless otherwise authorised by the Certificate holder.

5 Practicability of installation

The systems should only be installed by installers who have been trained and approved by the Certificate holder.

6 Weathertightness



6.1 The systems, including joints, when completely sealed and consolidated, will adequately resist the passage of moisture into the building and enable a roof to comply with the requirements of the national Building Regulations:

England and Wales — Approved Document C, Requirement C2(b), Section 6

Scotland — Mandatory Standard 3.10, clauses 3.10.1⁽¹⁾⁽²⁾ and 3.10.7⁽¹⁾⁽²⁾

(1) Technical Handbook (Domestic).

(2) Technical Handbook (Non-Domestic).

Northern Ireland — Regulation 28(b).

6.2 The membranes are impervious to water and will achieve a weathertight roof capable of accepting minor structural movement.

7 Properties in relation to fire



7.1 When tested, a system comprising a profiled steel deck, a 250 µm polyethylene layer of aluminium-faced polyurethane foam and one layer of 1.2 mm RubberBond FR EPDM, mechanically fastened through the insulation and vapour barrier to the deck, is considered to be unrestricted.

7.2 When tested to DD CEN/TS 1187 : 2012, Test 4 and classified to BS EN 13501-5 : 2005 in the following systems, the non-reinforced version of RubberBond achieved a Class B_{ROOF}(t4):

- an 18 mm plywood with a fully-adhered 1.2 mm RubberBond non-reinforced EPDM membrane
- an 18 mm plywood with a fully-adhered 1.5 mm RubberBond non-reinforced EPDM membrane.

7.3 The designation of other specifications should be confirmed by:

England and Wales — test or assessment in accordance with Approved Document B, Appendix A, clause 1

Scotland — tests to conform to Mandatory Standard 2.8, clause 2.8.1⁽¹⁾⁽²⁾

(1) Technical Handbook (Domestic).

(2) Technical Handbook (Non-Domestic).

Northern Ireland — test or assessment by a UKAS accredited laboratory or an independent consultant with appropriate experience.

8 Resistance to wind uplift

8.1 The resistance to wind uplift of a mechanically-fastened waterproofing layer is provided by the fasteners passing through the membrane into the substrate. The number and position of fixings will depend upon a number of factors including:

- wind uplift forces to be restrained
- pull-out strength of the fasteners
- tensile properties of the membrane
- appropriate calculation of safety factors.

8.2 Wind uplift forces are calculated in accordance with BS EN 1991-1-4 : 2005 and its UK National Annex, to establish the number of fixings and the pattern in which they are to be employed.

8.3 When installing the systems in areas of high wind loads, the 2.13 m wide membrane should be used.

8.4 The Certificate holder offers a design service which takes into account all the relevant supplied information. Assistance is provided when preparing drawings for the position of fixings, type of screws to be used and the number of fixings required.

Fully adhered

8.5 The adhesion of adhered systems is sufficient to resist the effects of wind suction, thermal cycling or other minor structural movements likely to occur in service. Where any doubt exists regarding the suitability of the substrate, the advice of the Certificate holder should be sought.

8.6 Where the membrane is adhered to insulation boards, the resistance to wind uplift will be dependent on the cohesive strength of the insulation and the method used to secure it to the roof deck. This aspect must be considered when selecting a suitable insulation material.

9 Resistance to foot traffic

Results of tests indicate that the systems can accept the limited foot traffic and light concentrated loads associated with installation and maintenance. Reasonable care should be taken to avoid puncture by sharp objects or concentrated loads. Where traffic in excess of this is envisaged, such as for maintenance of lift equipment, a layer of 8 mm thick SBR Walkway sheeting should be provided in accordance with the Certificate holder's instructions.

10 Maintenance

10.1 Systems must be the subject of annual inspections and maintenance to ensure continued performance.

10.2 Where damage has occurred it should be repaired in accordance with section 15 and the Certificate holder's instructions.

11 Durability

Accelerated weathering tests and evidence from use in the USA and Europe confirm that satisfactory retention of physical properties is achieved. Under normal conditions, the RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems will have a service life in excess of 35 years.

Installation

12 General

12.1 Installation of RubberBond FR EPDM Roof Waterproofing Systems must be carried out by trained installers, in accordance with the Certificate holder's instructions and this Certificate. A list of trained and approved operatives is available from the Certificate holder.

12.2 Substrates to which the systems are applied must be sound, dry, clean and free from sharp projections such as nail heads and concrete nibs. When the systems are to be laid on a rough substrate, a loose-laid, non-woven polyester fleece (minimum 150 g·m⁻²) must be placed over the substrate.

12.3 Installation should not be carried out during inclement weather (eg rain, fog, snow). When the temperature is below 5°C suitable precautions against surface condensation must be taken.

12.4 Where contact with low-grade bitumen, coal tar or oil-based products is likely, an isolating layer should be interposed between the product and the substrate. If compatibility with other products is in doubt, the advice of the Certificate holder should be sought.

12.5 The membrane must be mechanically fastened around the perimeter of the roof and around any penetration of the sheet, using fastening plates or reinforced universal securement strip (RUSS).

13 Procedure

Mechanically fastened

13.1 The membrane is laid flat onto the deck or insulation, without folds or ripples, and fixed to the deck with screws passing through the discs and the membrane (and insulation board, where appropriate) at 300 mm maximum centres. Insulation boards must be independently attached with fasteners and discs at the rate recommended by the insulation manufacturer's instructions and with the Certificate holder's agreement.

13.2 The exact fixing pattern will depend on the expected wind loads and specification used. In all cases, the advice of the Certificate holder should be sought on width of membrane, the fixing pattern and perimeter details.

13.3 The fixings are waterproofed by lap jointing the adjacent sheet over the fixings to the first sheet. The lap should be a minimum of 150 mm wide, of which 50 mm should be between the fixing discs and the waterproofing membrane edge.

13.4 The membrane is secured around perimeters of the roof and any penetration of the sheet, using fixing discs at 300 mm maximum centres. These fixings are waterproofed using EPDM flashing, extending over the fixings by at least 50 mm.

Fully adhered

13.5 The membrane is used for fully-adhered applications on roofs with a minimum finished fall in excess of 1:80.

13.6 All insulation boards are attached to the structural deck by bitumen bond, adhesives or mechanical fasteners as appropriate to the type and thickness.

13.7 When used as a fully-adhered system, the resistance to wind uplift will be limited by the cohesive strength of the insulation and the method of attachment. These factors should be taken into account when selecting the insulation material. Polyurethane insulation boards must be mechanically fixed, bonded in a polyurethane adhesive or bitumen bonded to prevent bowing.

13.8 The fully-adhered application may not be used directly onto insulation materials (eg polystyrene) which would be adversely affected by the solvent in the adhesive, or onto bituminous materials, without consulting the manufacturer.

13.9 A layer of bonding adhesive is applied to both the substrate and the membrane by means of a roller at an application rate of 0.75 litres per m². When the adhesive has reached its tacky point, the membrane is applied to the substrate and rolled to ensure that a full bond is achieved and that no air has been trapped beneath the membrane.

13.10 The membrane is mechanically fastened around the perimeter and penetrations (see section 12.5). The laps are sealed and the flashing installed (see sections 14.1 to 14.10 and sections 14.11 to 14.13 respectively).

14 Details

Seaming procedure (Splicing Cement)

Mechanically fastened

14.1 At laps, the top sheet is folded back by about 300 mm and both surfaces of the lap are cleaned with Splice Cleaner, HP-250 Primer or LV-600 Primer. Splicing Cement is applied to both surfaces by roller to give an even coverage, and must be allowed to dry until tacky. A continuous 4 mm bead of In-Seam Sealant is applied along the centre line of the seam and around the outside edge of the fixing discs. The top sheet is rolled forward until the cemented areas almost touch, and allowed to fall freely into place to avoid stretching or wrinkling.

14.2 The lap is rolled with a steel or silicone roller, applying positive pressure, towards the outer edge of the lap. The edge is cleaned using Splice Cleaner. After checking that a good seal has been achieved, a bead of Lap Sealant is applied to the exposed edge of the lap.

Fully adhered

14.3 At laps, the top sheet is folded back by about 300 mm and both surfaces of the lap are cleaned with Splice Cleaner, HP-250 Primer or LV-600 Primer. Splicing Cement is applied to both surfaces by roller to give an even coverage, and must be allowed to dry until tacky. A continuous 4 mm bead of In-Seam Sealant is applied 12 mm in from the back edge of the splice. The top sheet is rolled back down towards the bottom sheet and joined by applying firm hand pressure.

14.4 The lap is rolled with a steel or silicone roller, applying positive pressure, towards the outer edge of the lap. The edge is cleaned using Splice Cleaner. After checking that a good seal has been achieved, a bead of Lap Sealant is applied to the exposed edge of the lap.

Seaming procedure (SecurTAPE)

14.5 Dirt and excess dust is cleaned from the area of the splice in accordance with the Certificate holder's instructions. The area is cleaned using either HP-250 or LV-600 Primer, and allowed to dry.

14.6 The bottom sheet is marked 13 mm from the edge of the top sheet along the entire length of the splice. The tape is aligned with the marked line and pressed down using firm, even hand pressure, leaving the top release liner in place.

14.7 The minimum splice width should be 50 mm, with a minimum of 3 mm of tape extending beyond the splice edge.

14.8 The top release liner is removed and the top sheet is allowed to fall freely onto the exposed tape. The top sheet is pressed onto the tape using firm, even hand pressure across the splice towards the outer edge of the lap.

14.9 The lap is rolled with either a steel or silicone roller, applying positive pressure, towards the outer edge of the lap, and not parallel to it. For lap joints at details, the edge is cleaned using Splice Cleaner, and a bead of Lap Sealant applied to the exposed edge of the lap.

Seaming procedure (Factory-applied Tape)

14.10 The rolls are laid out in accordance with the Certificate holder's instructions. The release film on the tape is removed and the splice primed prior to consolidation of the joint.

Flashing

14.11 Concurrently with the installation of the EPDM membrane, the EPDM flashing is applied. The flashing is first bonded to the horizontal EPDM membrane and lapped, according to the procedure in sections 14.1 to 14.9, with minimum lap widths of 75 mm. A continuation of the deck membrane may be used for flashing, as is the practice when RUSS strip is used.

14.12 The flashing is fully adhered to the vertical surface of the wall using bonding adhesive applied by roller at a rate of 0.75 litres per m². When the adhesive becomes tacky, the flashing is applied to the substrate and rolled to ensure a full bond, without air trapped beneath the membrane.

14.13 Advice for specific flashing requirements is available from the manufacturer.

In the event of damage, repairs can be carried out by cleaning the area around the damage and applying a patch of the product as prescribed in the Certificate holder's instructions (see section 13).

Tests on the membranes were conducted and the results assessed to determine:

- water vapour transmission
- tensile strength/elongation
- tear strength
- low temperature flexibility
- dimensional stability
- static loading
- dynamic impact
- heat ageing
- ozone resistance
- UV ageing.

to assess:

- robustness during service
- vapour transmission properties
- durability.

17 Investigations

17.1 Tests on joints produced using Splicing Cement, SecurTAPE HP-250 and SecurTAPE LV-600 were conducted on RubberBond Non-reinforced EPDM Systems (see Product Sheet 1) to assess the suitability of jointing methods and determine:

- shear strength on joints
- T-peel for HP-250 and LV-600.

17.2 Existing data on fire performance of the membrane were assessed.

17.3 A user survey was performed to assess the performance of the membrane in the UK.

17.4 The manufacturing process was evaluated, and details were obtained of the quality and composition of the materials used.

17.5 The fully adhered method of installation was assessed on the basis of test results on RubberBond Non-reinforced EPDM Membranes (see Product Sheet 1).

17.6 A 30-year-old existing site was visited to assess the durability of the EPDM membranes.
